Grace Lutheran Church Unapproved Annual Meeting Minutes January 27, 2019

Council President Jeanette Ripley convened the Congregational Annual Meeting of Grace Lutheran Church at 11:55 A.M. following the morning worship service on January 27, 2019. She opened with a devotional based on Acts 2 and then thanked the paid staff and myriad volunteers whose work helps keep our church operating efficiently.

Duly made and seconded motions to approve this meeting's agenda as well as minutes of the 2018 Congregational Annual Meeting passed on voice votes.

Congregational members in attendance reviewed Grace Lutheran Church Statistics for 2018 and treasurer's reports (General Fund, Savings Account, Building Expansion Fund, Memorials, Major Maintenance Fund, and Concert/Mission of the Month) as well as financial reports from the Bagstevold Cemetery Association, Grace Lutheran Women, Memorials, Sunday School, and The Foundry as submitted and printed in the 2018 Annual Report. Upon being duly made and seconded, a motion to approve all of these reports carried on voice vote.

The proposed budget for 2019 included the following line item changes from the 2018 budget:

- A \$50 decrease for Sola Publishing
- A \$50 increase for the Augustana District of the Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC)
- A \$500 increase for church maintenance (including lawn mowing and snow removal)
- A \$2/hour increase for the facility support position
- A \$0.50/hour increase for the custodian, office secretary, and treasurer positions and a \$2/service organist increase
- An \$1,800 increase for pastoral base salary, a \$1,200 increase for his insurance, and a \$420 increase for his pension, a \$102.50 increase for his Social Security allowance; eliminating the part-time visitation pastor \$6,000 salary replaced by a \$500 increase for pulpit supply ministry
- A \$100 increase for the Choir Fund

Following discussion, a duly made and seconded motion to approve the total budget of \$172,076.50 passed on voice vote.

Tellers Karen Nelson and Phyllis Rossow distributed the ballot as proposed by the Nominating Committee. Ripley reviewed the ballot and called for additional nominations from the floor. Hearing none, a motion to cast a unanimous ballot was duly made, seconded, and carried on voice vote. Ripley thanked the Nominating Committee and all who had agreed to serve, including:

- Incumbent Council members (three-year terms) – Jim Klitzke, Jeanette Ripley, Rachel Ronnevik
- Nominating Committee (one-year terms) – Phil Johnson, Karen Rossum
- Youth Committee (two-year terms) – Lindsay Milbeck, Brittany LaPoint
- Property Committee - Phil Johnson, Dean Nelson
- Bagstevold Cemetery Association (three-year term) – Dale Gilbertson
- Bagstevold Cemetery Association (two-year term to replace LeRoy Ouren) – Jerry Pederson
- Education Committee – (three-year term) Arlinda Tollefson
- Audit Committee (two-year term) – Linda Wright
- Memorial Secretary (one-year term) – Bev Ouren

Ripley led a discussion regarding sanctuary seating. The Sanctuary Seating Fund balance of approximately \$19,000 represents nearly half of the needed \$35,000 to \$40,000. Consensus was for the Sanctuary Seating Committee to work to attain that goal by the end of 2019, perhaps by accepting pledges. The tellers distributed ballots for a straw vote regarding preference for chairs or pews and tallied the vote; those in attendance at this meeting overwhelmingly preferred pews.

Ripley presented the council's recommendation that our church's longer, more detailed current mission statement become the vision statement and the new, more concise mission statement be adopted. With no objections raised, these mission and vision statements will be implemented as recommended.

The current Fundraising Committee, composed of Phyllis Gilbertson, Sheila Ouren, Karen Rossum, Myrna Skunberg, Pat Teberg, and Faye Thompson, is seeking volunteers. No one volunteered at this meeting.

This meeting adjourned at 11:56 A.M. followed by the Lord's Prayer, table prayer, and a potluck meal.

**Grace Lutheran Church
Unapproved council meeting minutes
February 19, 2019**

Vice President Duane Haiby called to order the regular meeting of the Grace Lutheran Church Council on February 19, 2019, at 6:05 P.M. in the chapel. This meeting had been postponed from its regularly scheduled date of February 12. Council members read our church's mission statement in unison:

Grace Lutheran strives to be a welcoming church family, committed to the Bible as God's truth, worshiping together, and reaching out to love, pray for, teach, and serve others in Christ's name.

Other council members present were Jim Klitzke, Karen Nelson, Kim Pederson, Rachel Ronnevik, Phyllis Rossow, and Cheryl Rotz as well as Pastor Brad Soenksen and Treasurer Lucy Stadum; council members Jeanette Ripley and Bruce Schaible were absent.

Pastor Brad led the council in devotions and prayer.

Following Klitzke's motion and Nelson's second, the agenda was approved on vote with one change.

Haiby thanked Klitzke, Ripley, and Ronnevik who had agreed to serve additional three-year terms as council members.

Haiby called for nominations for council officers. Klitzke nominated Ripley for president, and Pederson seconded the nomination. Rossow nominated Haiby for vice president, and Rotz seconded this nomination. Ronnevik nominated Rossow for secretary; Nelson seconded the nomination. Klitzke moved that nominations cease and that those nominated be unanimously elected. Nelson seconded this motion, which carried on vote.

Pederson moved that Stadum be reappointed as treasurer; Ronnevik seconded this motion, and it passed on vote.

Pederson made a motion to approve the minutes of the January meeting, Klitzke seconded this motion, and it carried on vote.

The January treasurer's reports were filed for audit after Nelson's motion and Rotz's second. As of January 31, 2019, the General Fund checking account balance was \$21,257.48, the Major Maintenance Fund balance remained \$11,766.14, the Building Expansion Fund balance was \$29,980.00, and the Concert/Mission of the Month Fund balance was \$1,655.70 with the Pelican Rapids Emergency Fund receiving \$590.00 as Mission of the Month for January.

Pastor Brad presented his report, which included leading Wednesday morning Bible studies; meetings with the Grace Prayer Team, the Pelican Rapids Ministerial group, The Foundry youth group (including Rock n' Bowl), a fellow pastor regarding the youth summer mission trip to Idaho, representatives from the Anne Carlsen Center for Children, the Grace Council, several meetings regarding membership, and one for wedding planning; numerous visitations; conducting Communion services at Riverfront on Main and the Pelican Valley Nursing Home in Pelican Rapids; attending choir practices, the Grace concert, and the Augustana District Theological Conference in Bloomington, Minnesota; helping with the men's ham dinner; and planning and conducting two visitation/prayer services/funerals/committals. He reported that Minister of Youth Dacia Johnson will attend the I Point Confirmation Retreat with the kids March 8 through 10 and that First

Communion instruction will begin on March 13 with First Communion at the Good Friday worship service.

Old business:

Discussion about implementing the mission and vision statements was tabled until the March meeting.

New business:

Haiby called for committee representatives/liaisons, and the following council members volunteered:

Karen Nelson - Council representative Nominating Committee

Kim Pederson - Council representative Audit Committee and Child and Youth Safety Committee

Jim Klitzke - Council representative Property Committee

Karen Nelson - Council liaison Grace Lutheran Women

Duane Haiby - Council liaison Fundraising Committee

Cheryl Rotz - Council liaison Youth Committee

Rachel Ronnevik - Council liaison Education Committee

It was announced at our congregational annual meeting that the Fundraising Committee is seeking volunteers. Following that meeting Curt and Jennifer Cardwell and Gary and Pat Cardwell, who are becoming new members of our church, volunteered to join this committee. Karen Nelson also agreed to help.

Council members selected their months to usher during the year.

March 6 is Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of our six weeks of Lenten Soup, Sandwich, and Word gatherings. Because no group had volunteered to serve the meal on March 6, consensus was to designate the Ash Wednesday meal as potluck. Council members signed up to provide soups and desserts (four of each) for the meal on March 13. Thrivent funds provide bread, crackers, meat, cheese, etc. Proceeds go to The Foundry youth, who bus tables and clean up after these meals.

Following discussion, Pederson made a motion to designate Faith Westby as mission of the month for March. Rossow seconded this motion, and it carried on vote.

The Pelican Rapids Food Shelf is mission of the month for February to take advantage of matching funds available in March through Minnesota FoodShare. The largest grassroots food and fund drive in the state, the Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign brings together various community organizations, businesses, and faith communities to help stock nearly 300 food shelves statewide.

Rossow moved to adjourn; Ronnevik seconded the motion, which carried on vote; and this meeting closed at 6:50 P.M. with the Lord's Prayer.

The next regular meeting of the Grace Lutheran Church Council is scheduled for 6 P.M. on Tuesday, March 12, 2019, in the chapel.

As usher for February, Rotz provided refreshments.

MISSION OF THE MONTH

Faith Westby of Pelican Rapids

Faith Westby was born with Kabuki syndrome, a rare disorder that affects multiple parts of the body. Doctors didn't think she'd live longer than 3 years. But her mom named her Faith and now she's 16 and still fighting. In early 2017 she was diagnosed with Liver Cancer and received a transplant that summer, but her body rejected the liver 5 times. A treatment for the rejection depleted her immune system. As a result, she is fighting a dangerous fungal infection in her blood stream. Faith has been in the hospital in Rochester since December.

Take a Seat!

God doesn't care if we sit in chairs or pews at church. He's just happy to see us at worship. While that is a comforting thought, the current "seating" situation at Grace Lutheran Church may not be.

That's why the Grace council established a "seating fund" to collection donations and memorials for the purchase of either new pews or chairs. Most of the existing pews are very old or in need of repair. "We really have to do something," said Jeanette Ripley, council president. "The council has done some research into costs and the various types of seating available. No decisions have been made, but we've definitely had a lot of interest and support."

The council's research included a review of the pros and cons of pews versus chairs. And while no decisions have been made, an unofficial tally at Grace's annual meeting indicates a preference for pews. "Most of our generation grew up in pews," said Duane Haiby, council vice president. "It's what we know, but that doesn't mean we aren't open to new ideas."

Here's a brief review of issues surrounding the great pew versus chair debate.

Increased Seating Capacity

Research indicates the average pew user takes up 24 inches of lineal seating space. The average worship chair is 20 inches wide. This nets a 20% increase in available seating in a worship application while also providing increased handicapped seating access.

Multi-Use Space

Chairs allow for flexible configuration of space for a variety of uses and worship applications which can expand the utility of existing space and/or eliminate additional construction requirements and costs. They are easier to use, move, and rotate about to spread out wear.

Cost Savings

Some cost comparisons indicate chairs are priced in the mid \$30's to \$50's per 20-inch seat while pews cost \$65+ per lineal foot with 20% fewer available seats per application. Estimates received by the council don't reflect such a significant cost comparison, however.

Flexibility

This is the pew's greatest practical strength. While pews are inflexible within the floor space, the seat space of the pew itself is very flexible. Because there is no designated, 24-inch seating area, as with a chair, a larger person can take up more space, and a smaller person less. A pew can be "packed" for special events, temporarily expanding the sanctuary's seating capacity.

However, if you want to use the sanctuary space for more than one purpose, or use a lot of different worship space configurations, it's tough to move pews and nearly impossible to store them. Pews don't stack well.


Comfort

Modern pews with padding are as comfortable as chairs.



Maintenance

Pews are easy to maintain. Chairs require much more cleaning and vacuuming.



What's next?

Following discussion and input at the annual meeting, a small group of parishioners will visit area churches to review their seating arrangements. At the last tally the seating fund has grown to \$21,550, nearly fifty percent of what early estimates indicate will be needed to purchase new seating. "We will keep parishioners informed as we gather more information. Early indications are that the congregation favors pews, but no decisions have been made. Please talk to any council member about your thoughts," says President Ripley.

In the meantime, regardless of your *deep-seated* preference for chairs or pews, your church family and God just want you here!
