Trading Places

I was at a ministerial meeting several years ago with a room full of pastors. As we were discussing various topics, one of my colleagues asked about preaching, specifically he asked all of us if we felt we could preach from Romans chapter 9 through 11. That question seemed somewhat strange to me. I came from a school of thought that said all of the Bible should, and could, be preached.

As the discussion continued, it became clear to me, from his perspective, these chapters were speaking specifically of Paul's relationship with his Jewish neighbors. You can really see Paul's heart for his Jewish brothers and sisters in this section of Romans. My colleague at the ministerial meeting felt it was not appropriate for us as Gentiles to preach a Christian sermon to a Gentile audience from this section of Holy Scripture. I think it is very appropriate because of the missionary passion that Paul is using as he is writing.

That prompts the question for me: what is the place of this section of scripture for us today? It is my overwhelming belief that the Bible, as we have it, is completely efficacious—meaning every single verse can be used. As 2 Timothy 3:16 says, "All scripture is God breathed and is profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness."

The logical step for us is to ask: what would this portion of scripture have for us today? In Romans, Paul's epistle to the church in Rome, we notice that the first eight chapters are all devoted to doctrine, then Paul takes a sojourn in chapter 9 by giving a section on application of that doctrine for his listening audience characterized predominantly as Jews living in exile. Notice what he says in Romans 9:1, "I am speaking the truth in Christ I'm not lying. My conscience bears witness in the Holy Spirit." Verse two goes on to say that Paul was in great sorrow and unceasing anguish in his heart. We can ask the question: why was he so sad? The answer begins to take shape in verse three when he says that he has a wish. He wants to wave his spiritual magic wand and change the course of direction for many of his spiritual kinsmen. Because he says, "For I wish that I myself was accursed and cut off from Christ for the sake of my brothers" Romans 9:3. This is an incredible statement posed by the greatest missionary the world has ever seen. Paul, in a moment of sheer compassion prompted by his intense anguish about the spiritual state of so many of his fellow Jews, states that he wished he could trade places with them. He has an overwhelming desire here to somehow exchange his spiritual position of grace, righteousness, and favor by God, so that many of the people that he would refer to as "brothers" could experience the same forgiveness, mercy and position in close proximity to the Creator of the entire universe.

This thought is incredibly convicting to me on a personal level. I say that because it seems to imply the possibility of us putting ourselves in the same position. Do we care for and love our neighbor so much that we would wish that we could trade places with them so that their position under God's rule and authority would be based on the complete eradication of all of their sins? Do we love people enough to wish that they had our spot in God's Kingdom? Even as I write this, I wonder if this is even an inappropriate question to ask because it seems so far-fetched but yet it's in the Bible? It is apparent that Paul is posing this hypothetically based on much of the rest of the content of chapter 9, but it still demonstrates an incredible concern for people.

I have heard people say things like this in moments of intense sorrow, loss, and pain. People seem quick to say, "Oh I wish I could trade places with you" or "If I could wave a magic wand to experience this pain, loss and anguish so that you could be freed from it." I've heard people say things like this and quietly wondered if they really meant it? Once again this is the miraculous nature of Christianity because we really truly have someone who traded places with us. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, came to this earth with the specific plan of trading places with us. Jesus was in a perfect position in proximity to God and he relinquished all of that by coming to

earth to die for us. In the words that Paul uses in Romans 9, Jesus was “cursed” for us. He was cut off from a perfect Trinitarian relationship for the sake of his brothers and sisters, which is us. He allowed himself to be separated to the extent that he was cut off so that we may receive what was rightfully intended to him. This is what would be called the great exchange. This is the exchange of God’s perfect righteousness demonstrated in Christ and it is traded for our sin. Did you ever as a child want to trade something with one of your peers? Perhaps it was a baseball card or a portion of your school lunch? In all of those transactions my suspicion is you were always looking for a fair trade. We all want to receive something back of equal value for what we relinquish. But this trade that we just articulated is the most unfair interaction of all time because Jesus is trading his perfect righteousness for all of our sin. It’s his perfection which is invading our depravity. This is his divinity being exchanged for our humanity. From God’s point of view he sees Jesus both as the executioner and the executed. He did it all for us so that Paul could wish that all of his ethnic brothers and sisters could receive the grace of Christ and so we could pray for our neighbors that they too can receive the same life giving gospel hope that we have been given.

Grace Lutheran Church Council Minutes, February 10, 2026

Council Members present: DeAnn Melkert (Vice President), Jeff Carlson, Rick Drevlow (President), and Duane Haiby.

New Council Members present (welcomed by DeAnn): Jim Klitze, Phyllis Rossow, and Brady Stadum.

Also in attendance: Pastor Steve Walswick and Hans Ronnevik.

Absent members: Shelly Fresonke and Karen Rossum.

The meeting was called to meeting and the mission statement was read in unison:

Grace Lutheran Church strives to be a welcoming church family, committed to the Bible as God's truth, worshiping together and reaching out to love, pray for, and serve others in Christ's name.

Pastor Steve led devotions and prayer.

The agenda was approved following Haiby's motion and Carlson's second.

Hans Ronnevik made a presentation promoting Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC) and its Augustana District, of which Grace Lutheran Church is a member. He also introduced Momentum Network, which is a project of the Institute of Lutheran Theology (ILT) seminary at Brookings, South Dakota. Momentum Network's purpose is to address the pastor shortage. Our church has been accepted into a cohort of 12 LCMC churches formed to address this problem. Members of Grace soon will find a survey in a Sunday bulletin as part of this project.

Pastor Steve's report included two funerals, several personal contacts and visits including one regarding membership, and conducting services at Pelican Rapids nursing homes. He recommended that the council approved sprucing up the youth room in the church basement with some paint, artwork, and perhaps other items that The Foundry might suggest under the guidance of youth group leader Becky Hoyer.

Klitzke moved to allocate \$500 to The Foundry for updating the youth meeting room. Haiby seconded this motion, which passed on vote.

The treasurer's reports were reviewed and filed for audit following Haiby's motion and Stadum's second. As of January 21, 2026, cash and various bank accounts totaled \$389,078.04. January income was \$12,021.55; expenses totaled \$11,986.68. Mason and Cassie Bakken and their premature twin sons received \$969.50 as January's Mission of the Month.

The secretary's reports of the January 13 council meeting and the January 24 annual meeting were reviewed and approved on vote following Haiby's motion and Carlson's second.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Our commitment to evangelism and outreach continues.
- The Vacation Bible School Committee, consisting of Pastor Steve, Tiffany Nelson, and Curt Cardwell, had no report.
- The Cold weather Committee had no updates.
- The audit was discussed. Drevlow will secure a date and time for the audit.
- Security cameras are being investigated. Smoke/carbon monoxide detectors have been purchased, and Phil Johnson will install them.

Council Officers who will serve until February 2027 meeting are President Rick Drevlow, Vice President DeAnn Melkert, and Secretary Karen Rossum.

Rossum moved to adjourn, Haiby seconded the motion, and the meeting closed with the Lord's Prayers at 7 P.M.

This month we added nine donated books: one children's biography, two adult non-fiction books, and six adult fiction novels. We thank those who made these donations! Most of our books are in the newly remodeled library/nursery, but the newest books and other chosen books will still be displayed on our shelves opposite the sanctuary.

Outlaw: The Real Story of William Tyndale and the English Bible from Voice of the Martyrs was written for children, but adults will also find his story interesting. Most people know that Martin Luther translated the Bible into German, against the laws of the Catholic Church, but few know that William Tyndale did the same for English speaking people. Both men suffered for their choice to give the people God's Word in the language they grew up speaking. This biography of Tyndale is inspiring! Many today still give their lives to translate the Bible into the languages spoken by people in countries where the Bible is forbidden. Will one of our Grace Lutheran children become a Bible translator?

Having a Bible in a language you can read is wonderful, but do you read it? If you do, do you understand it? Does it change your life? **How to Study Your Bible** by Kay Arthur shows you how to discover what a passage says, what it means, and how to put into practice the truths revealed to you in the passage. The book jacket declares, "This unique Scripture study is an excellent guide for young and mature Christians alike."

Perhaps you read your Bible, and you attend church, but you still have a lot of questions you'd like to ask God. Here's a book that might help you. **God, What is the Answer? Answers to Life's Tough Questions**, by Marie D. Jones and Randy Peterson. Here are a few sample questions from the book. "If God is all-powerful and unquestionably compassionate, why doesn't He stop the world's suffering or evil?" "Jesus said that I have to love my enemy, but how can I love someone I hate?" "Will I recognize people in heaven?"

Karen Kingsbury is a favorite author of Christian fiction set in modern times, dealing with the trials, temptations, and blessings of daily life. We have two new books from the Lost Love Series: **Ever After** and **Even Now**. Another novel is very timely since Amiee's nephew is currently on American Idol. **Fifteen Minutes** is about an American Idol-style show and the risks it holds for contestants. We also added A Time to Embrace from Kingsbury's Women of Faith Series. Second copies of **Leaving** and **Summer** were also added.



Cari Jo Ripley is the daughter-in-law of John & Carol Ripley. Cari & Chris Ripley live in Ashby, they have 2 grown daughters Raelynn and Madalyn along with 2 grandsons, Spencer and Sinan.

Cari was born with an illness that has affected her respiratory system that doctors have yet to name. her first lung surgery was when she was in high school to remove the middle lobe of her right lung that had become dead tissue from many years of infections. Her second lung surgery was a few years later when they went in to repair/remove a portion of her left lung after a spontaneous pneumothorax (collapsed lung) that wouldn't heal on its own. She has needed supplemental oxygen for much of her life. Overall the years of stress on her body has caused her heart to become enlarged with pulmonary hypertension. After many years of doctors, appointments, procedures, tests and hospital stays, Cari was finally approved for a double lung transplant and put on the UNOS list on 11/14/2025. Cari was called by the Mayo Clinic on 11/30/2025 with the amazing news that lungs were available for transplant and she underwent her double lung transplant on 12/1/2025. Donations will go towards medical bills. Anything is appreciated even if it's just your prayers for a successful recovery!
